Potential hazard


A very dangerous situation at the wharf and Battery Park in New Castle was brought to the attention of Cobblestones. A savvy Cobble reader feels the City and/or Trustees should correct this before someone falls off the edge. About 100 feet of fence is needed until proper repairs are made.

A member of the Trustees offered the following:

Many months ago, the Trust, as management authority of the Park, approved a funding match for a State grant to develop construction documents for a living shoreline, approximately 100 lineal feet in length. (see page 7).

The project scope will replace the existing wooden bulkhead. The City of New Castle was the grant applicant, as the fee simple owner of the Park property. The grant application was discussed and approved by Council months ago at a Council meeting and this information was reported widely. Upon completion of the construction documents, funding sources will be identified for the construction, which is expected to be several hundred thousand dollars.

The existing bulkhead, a structure installed decades ago, is maintained for erosion with backfill, as needed, by the Trust. These measures are considered interim, until the larger plan is implemented. There has not been a report, to my knowledge, of anyone that has "fallen off" this low bulkhead and the area is at least as safe as it has been. Continued on page 7





There's a good chance you have all the ingredients in your kitchen cupboards and fridge to make these this very weekend. *All you need is flour, sugar, baking powder, milk, eggs and vanilla. For the cinnamon sugar swirl you'll need dark brown sugar, butter and cinnamon*.

In a medium bowl whisk together the 2 cups flour, 1 tbsp of both sugar and baking powder and a tsp of kosher salt.

Next, pour in the 2 cups of milk, crack in both eggs and 1/2 tsp of vanilla extract.

Whisk until the wet ingredients are incorporated into the dry, pour in the tbsp of coconut oil and set aside.

In a small saucepan, melt the 1/2 cup (1 stick) of unsalted butter and stir in the 3/4 cup of dark brown sugar and rounded tbsp of cinnamon. Pour it into

a reusable squeeze bottle, which will make it a whole lot easier to drizzle into a spiral. Otherwise you can pour into a ziplock baggie and snip the corner. Happy your griddle to 400° and grease with coconut oil. *Pour 1/3 cup of the pancake batter on to your griddle.* Now that the batter has spread out, start in the center, and *then drizzle the brown sugar and cinnamon mixture in a spiral design.*



Then, once the bubbles pop and stop filling back in, flip and cook for an additional 1 to 3 minutes. You want the brown sugar mixture to have a chance to caramelize.



Bulkhead from page 1

A recent storm caused some erosion, as those intense storms typically do, but there was no apparent structural change to the bulkhead.

Erosion repairs have already been made and much of the debris and wash up trash has been removed by the Trust maintenance team.

This living shoreline is one of the many multiphase green infrastructure property improvements, led by the Trust. These property advancements include meadow developments throughout the City, drainage infrastructure through the Park, supporting water quantity and quality run off from Delaware Street, W. 3rd and W. 4th Street, as well as walkway and other open space improvements.







This Summary of the Feb. 10 Special Meeting for Budget Review and Feb. 11 Regular Meeting meeting from the notes of Council member Suzanne Souder and NOT an official record of the meeting.

BUDGET REVIEW- All Council members present except Mr. Platt who had an

unexpected work commitment. Treasure Janet Carlin, Finance Director Kathy Walls, and City Administrator Bill Barthel were also present.

According to Linda Ratchford, property taxes are our biggest income source. While discussing the possibility of a tax increase at our last budget meeting, we asked for the breakdown of residential and commercial properties in the City. We learned tonight that we can't get exact numbers as City records don't break things down this way and all types of properties are taxed at the same rate, currently \$1.2 per \$100 of assessed value. In New Castle County, only the county does reassessments and last did so in 1983. We could reassess on our own but would have to pay for it and it is very costly.

TTY COUNCIL SUMMARY

Based on New Castle County tax records we have about 2600 properties. Of these, 122 are commercial, 10 apartments, 60 industrial, 63 exempt commercial (we weren't sure what this is, it could be government buildings), 12 utilities, 1 farm, and 2331 residential.

Another way of looking at it is by the number of water meters for various types of property. According to the MSC we have 1882 single family homes, 75 multi-family master (a single meter for multiple units), 177 multi-family individual (each unit has own meter), 16 government, 144 commercial (includes nonprofits), 3 agricultural, and 16 city/MSC. We discussed what other cities do and compared tax rates. Russ Smith said that Odessa and Elsmere apply different tax rates to residential and commercial properties. Ms Ratchford mentioned that some cities charge various fees per unit. For example, Elsmere charges \$437 plus the tax based on assessed value. Middletown has a street fee to cover street maintenance. Wilmington and others have storm water fees.

We compared New Castle tax rates to those in other cities in the county. These range from \$1.99 per \$100 (Wilmington & Hockessin) to \$0.30 in Middletown which has other fees as mentioned above. So, New Castle is about in the middle.

I asked when the City tax rate was last raised. It was in 2009. I looked up the inflation rate since then on a US Dept. of Labor website and found that from Jan. 2009 to Dec. 2019 inflation totaled 21.7%. The City has done a lot of economizing during this period through reorganization so we are "keeping the lights on" but don't have much left over for capital projects or grants to non-profits such as Goodwill Fire Company or the Historical Society which runs our Visitors' Center.

We discussed needed capital projects. The City Engineer and the Building Official keep a list of needed projects in priority order. The order can shift as things change but currently 13th St & Baldt Ave, 2nd St, and 2 others Mr. Barthel couldn't recall are at the top. As I reported about the last budget meeting, the cost of capital projects is not evenly distributed. Some years we do a large project such as Delaware St. while less is done in other years. For perspective, cumulative expenditures for major road and drainage projects from FY11 through FY 21 total \$5,984,000 for an average of \$536,731 per year. Not all of this is funded from City income because we receive Municipal Street Aid from the State. Also, state legislators have Community Transportation Fund money to distribute for such projects in their districts. New Castle is fortunate to also have the Trustees to assist with such projects.

Russ Smith asked if we have a backlog or are keeping current. Bill Barthel said we aren't really keeping current but have increased these expenditures in recent years. He added that streets don't deteriorate at an even rate as some areas have more truck traffic, etc. He added that we will have a better sense of what is needed for FY21 in another month or two after costs for current projects become more certain. For example, we are still waiting for final numbers on changes to the Delaware Street Project due to the utility work being combined with the repaving. (More about this in the notes on the regular meeting.)

Ms Ratchford explained that the Street Aid from the State is a set formula of so much per mile of roads per year. Transportation Fund grants from our legislators are less predictable. We have also received other grants for specific projects such as from DNREC and the Conservation District.

We discussed the possibility of designating most or all of any tax increase to capital projects. I said I thought a tax increase might be more acceptable to most residents if they knew the money was going to street repair and other capital improvements. Kathy Walls, City Finance Director, reminded us that any such commitment we make could not dictate the action of future Councils. In other words we could designate an amount to go into a capital reserve fund but a future Council could choose to spend the money for other things. I said we can't control the actions of future Councils but they would have to answer to residents for their decisions.

We had a brief discussion of other items such as funding for plantings in the City, holiday decorations, etc; money for Goodwill Fire Company; and funding to staff the Visitors' Center full time at least during our peak season.

Ms Walls pointed out that we don't yet know how much income will decrease due to the Downtown Development District fee and tax waivers. So far there are 3 applicants for this program. Mr. Barthel said that by April or May we should have the report on the MSC/City campus plan which would spell out the next phase and cost estimates should we decide to proceed.

We ended with the decision to each submit a list of our top priorities for spending (in priority order) to Mr. Barthel with approximate costs included. We will meet again in March to consolidate the lists.

REGULAR MEETING-All Council members present plus Mr. Barthel, Ms Carlin, Building Official Jeff Bergstrom, Mayor Quaranta, and Chief McCabe

This was a relatively short meeting with **no Resolutions or Ordinances**

We began with **A PROCLAMATION** from the Mayor honoring **Sally Monigle** for her many contributions to the historic preservation of the City of New Castle. Mrs. Monigle was unable to attend due to her health but 2 of her grandsons and several friends were present. A signed copy of the proclamation will be given to Mrs. Monigle.

MSC Report on placing wires underground along Delaware Street Pam Patone, General Manager of the Municipal Services Commission, gave a presentation about placing utility lines underground along Delaware Street as part of the large project to repair the street. Ms Patone said they have been working on this for some time. She met with representatives of Delmarva Power, Verizon, and Comcast as well as

lines will be attached to their homes or businesses.

The full cost of the project is \$760,000 which includes new transformers. This will cover Delaware Street from the Wharf to 4th St. plus Dalby Alley which is crucial to manhole placement. The project was approved by the MSC at a meeting on Jan. 16, 2020.

meeting with the citizens affected by the project to discuss how power

They have to work on right-of-way issues such as on sidewalks and coordinate scheduling. Ms Patone will serve as coordinator among all the contractors since she is located in New Castle. The process will start with contractor Henkels & McCoy preparing the street; then MSC, Verizon, and Comcast will place their wires and transformers; poles will be removed; and sidewalks will be repaired.

Mr. Barthel said that these additions move expected completion of the Delaware Street Project from late May to late October. Ms Patone added that their work will be completed in Nov. She will keep affected residents updated.

Ms Ratchford asked if MSC will also co-ordinate with Delmarva Power and Ms Patone replied that they will. Ms Ratchford also asked about the placement of electric meters. Scott Blomquist, Electric Utility Manager, said that most will stay in their current locations. Ms Ratchford then asked about landscaping for the gas meters. Ms Patone said Delmarva is trying to work with residents to give them options. Ms Ratchford said she hoped Delmarva would work to minimize the impact on historic buildings.

Mr. Barthel talked about the contractors minimizing vibrations and noise in town. He said they are very cooperative and use saw cuts instead of jack hammers whenever possible.

Ms Patone closed by saying that all residents she has spoken with are very excited about getting the wires underground and are co-operative. Ms Leary asked about row houses with no exposed sides if residents don't want the gas meter in front. Ms Ratchford said meters can be inside, only the regulators, which are quite small, must be outside. Ms Leary then asked why the gas lines are being changed. Mr Blomquist said they are changing to a more efficient high-pressure system which does require the outside regulators for safety.

Ms Ratchford said that this will be a Tier 1 review with HAC and Delmarva is currently completing the paperwork. She then asked if Verizon and Comcast wires will also be underground. Ms Patone said they will and the companies have been very cooperative. MSC is absorbing the cost of the excavation. Verizon is charging for this conversion as they have no business reason to do it. MSC is paying this as a contribution as it is not part of the electric conversion. She added that both Comcast and Verizon are using good contractors.

Ms Ratchford reminded us of the pending Ordinance requiring all new utility wires to be placed underground which will be the subject of a public hearing. Mr. Platt added that the residents of Van Dyke Village are very happy with the project to place wires underground there. He asked where the transformers will be placed in town. Ms Patone said they will be in the manholes as there is no other place for them. Mr. Blomquist added that the transformers are designed to be submergible. Ms Ratchford then asked for public comments or questions on this issue. Victor Bryson wanted to know if there would be any cost to homeowners for this, now or in the future. Ms Patone replied that their rate design includes improvements and rates are actually going down. Ms Ratchford added that having wires underground reduces liability and eliminates problems from trees falling on power lines. Mayor Quaranta asked how rates can go down with all this work. Ms Patone said they buy power through 5-year contracts. The price of natural gas has declined since the last contract so rates can be lower.

As we moved on to the next phase of the meeting, Mr. Platt asked if there were minutes from the prior meeting. Ms Ratchford said they were not yet ready.

Treasurer's Report

Janet Carlin reported that we remain on schedule in the budgeting process.

City Administrator's Report

Mr. Barthel reminded us that the repair of the railroad crossing at Ferry Cutoff has been delayed to July of 2021. In connection with that we had discussed the possibility of a traffic light at 9th and Delaware St. with DELDOT. They are in the final stages of their review but think the light will be needed for safety reasons even though it is not justified by traffic volume. Mr. Barthel wants to have a DELDOT representative attend a future meeting to explain this fully.

Ms Ratchford asked how the drains performed given all the recent rain. Mr. Barthel said that the work done on the drains has helped and things are in decent shape considering the amount of rain we've had. DELDOT cleaned the area near the Ice Cream Corral on Ferry Cutoff. There was still some accumulation of water there but not as much as in the past. Mr. Platt said he doesn't think they cleaned it well as there is still a lot of trash in the ditch. He said it appears all they did was cut the phragmites.

Mr. Smith asked who was responsible for the storm drains at 2nd and Chestnut near the meadow as they also need to be cleaned. Mr. Barthel said we asked the Conservation District. The Trustees did some clean up there a few years ago. Mr. Smith then said that drainage at the intersection of 7th and Washington St. was still a problem due to run off from the apartments. Mr. Barthel said there are several catch basins there. Mr. Smith added that drainage on 3rd Street was much improved thanks to the Trustees and the City.

Mr. Platt said he is still concerned about the drainage in front of the Ice Cream Corral especially when the accumulated water and splashes from cars driving through freeze. Mr. Bergstrom, City Building Official, said he will ask the City Engineer to review this area. Mr. Barthel agreed. Mayor Quaranta pointed out that we have asked WILMAPCO to review the entire Ferry Cutoff area and thinks we need a holistic rather than a piecemeal approach to correcting the problems. Ms Ratchford said this review begins in May and flooding is one of the issues to be considered.

Chief of Police Report

Chief McCabe said the atTAck Addiction walk/run takes place on March 7. He asked us to follow the Police Dept. on Facebook for information about the route as this event gets larger every year.

He saw no patterns in the quality of life complaints and reported that there were several significant drug arrests including one in Van Dyke Village. Ms Ratchford asked about porch pirates. Chief McCabe said that hasn't been a big problem here but knows it is in some surrounding areas. He said if possible have neighbors take in packages or have them delivered somewhere safer than the front porch.

Ms Ratchford asked about the water on Rt. 9 south of Dobbinsville. She wondered if people who drive through the water can be ticketed if there are signs up indicating that the road is closed. The Chief said they can be ticketed but we don't have enough officers to cover that area constantly when there is flooding. The officers do try to drive by as often as possible.

There were no communications from Council members or the President of Council.

Mayor's Report

The Mayor reported on the successful job fair at the Library held by **Just Food For Dogs**, a new business in the City which is located in Center Point Industrial Park. They will be hiring 70 or more people as they move towards their planned opening in March. The company makes fresh, human-grade food for dogs which will be distributed through PETCO in this area. Mr. Platt said he also attended and was impressed with their enthusiasm. They offer jobs at \$15 per hour with benefits. Mr. Quaranta said he hopes the Brandywine Valley SPCA will work with them and added that, with this addition, Center Point Industrial Park is full.

The City Arts Council has been active and Opera Delaware will host a performance on March 13 in the Parish House with some stand-up comedy at Sonora Restaurant after the opera performance. He thanked all who worked to make this happen and Paul McConnell of McConnell Development who made a generous contribution.

He said he has looked at the **signage for bikers coming to town** on the Markel Trail and thinks it could use some improvement. Ms Ratchford said Mr. Smith is working on this and that we have funds from the River Towns Festival designated for biking.

Mr. Quaranta ended by saying he attended the Goodwill banquet on Feb. 1 where the recognitions approved at the last Council meeting were read.

Public Comments

Victor Bryson said the problem with the road in Dobbinsville needs to be fixed. There are many bumps which are noisy when trucks hit them or the manhole covers. He thinks a small adjustment would correct this. He also took note of Mr. Barthel's report that the contractors working on Delaware St. use saws rather than jack hammers. He said that when work was done in Dobbinsville they used heavy jack hammers which caused vibrations in houses, cracking the plaster. Ms Ratchford said we would look into the noise problem.

Phil Gross said the bulkhead along Battery Park is in bad shape after recent storms and could be a major liability problem. He thinks it needs immediate attention rather than building an unnecessary parking lot. Ms Ratchford said short term repairs will be made.

Rod Gillespie said Council should pressure the Trustees to suspend work on the 3rd Street parking lot as the project is based on false premises. The AECOM study recommended making better use of existing parking before building new lots. He thinks the lot was approved based on the work of UD students which was not a valid study done by professionals. He said a FOIA request to the City showed that there was no request for a proposal and no invoice for what he called "a real study".

Karen Whalen asked if the 3rd Street parking lot was reviewed by the Delaware Division of Historical and Cultural Affairs. She said she has heard both that it was and that it was not. Ms Ratchford said the Division was not consulted as this was City and private business. Ms Whalen said she thinks something of this size and impact should go through the Division as HAC is not qualified to review such projects. They review proposals for work on houses. She believes the lot was "ramrodded through" and will create a black mark which will damage the City's brand.
