





Remove the steaks from the refrigerator for at least 30 minutes and up to 1 hour prior to cooking. Sprinkle all sides with salt.

Coarsely crush the peppercorns. Spread the peppercorns evenly onto a plate. Press the fillets, on both sides, into the pepper until it coats the surface. Set aside.

In a medium skillet over medium heat, melt the butter and olive oil. As soon as the butter and oil begin to turn golden and smoke, gently place the steaks in the pan. For medium-rare, cook for 4 minutes on each side. Once done, remove the steaks to a plate, tent with foil and set aside. Pour off the excess fat but do not wipe or scrape the pan clean.

Turn off the heat, add 1/3 cup Cognac to the pan and carefully ignite the alcohol with a long match or firestick. Gently shake pan until the flames die. Return the pan to medium heat and add the cream. Bring the mixture to a boil and whisk until the sauce coats the back of a spoon, approximately 5 to 6 minutes. Add the teaspoon of Cognac and season, to taste, with salt. Add the steaks back to the pan, spoon the sauce over, and serve.

NOTE: that when igniting alcohol, use extreme caution. Remove the pan from the heat source before adding the alcohol. Pour the alcohol into the pan and ignite with a match or click lighter. Return the pan to the stove top and gently swirl to reduce the flames.

Deciding which red wine to pair with your dinner requires consideration toward the cut of the meat and the level of doneness. Lean meats, for

example, pair best with wines that have less tannins. Cuts that have more fat, such as ribeye, can handle something more brawny. Juicy wines improve the flavor of steaks cooked to well-done, while earthier wines pair beautifully with medium-rare steaks.

Rare Ribeye 2008 Chono Carmenère Reserva

This Chilean Carmenère pairs perfectly with rare ribeye, or a nice strip steak

There is truly no better pairing for grilled meat than a fine malbec from Argentina.



understand our great town of New Castle (and surrounding areas). I feel we will never know who we are until we know who we were.

I grew up in New Castle and always had this yearning for knowledge into why two of the most important people in my life lived with such peace and the need to never stray from our town. In doing my research I found that my grandfather, Charles "Dick" Willis, held a title (*senator*) he was so proud yet so amazingly humble to have. Which was only held by a handful of people from New Castle. And my great grandmother Elizabeth "Libby" Willis) who devoted her life to being part of New Castle.

She was a devoted wife to Mr Rodney Willis whose name is in the historic register of New Castle at his home at 126 Harmony Street, the Rodney Willis House. She also held jobs at the local pharmacy and gave time to helping with St. Peter's Bazaar. We would never miss the walks shared together as she educated me on each street and history. We sat on our porch and watched the steeple burn down in the 80s. I asked why the tears, thinking she felt endangered of the flames. To my surprise she looked at me and told me all that work and history is being destroyed in a fraction of time it took to build.

Others such as mass feeding at the Arsenal. Wassams snow cones and teaching me to respect and preserve history. If I had a hero I would have to pick my great grandmother and not just for her civic duties but when we walked together I saw such respect that she gave to each person we passed and vise versa. That respect took many years of compassion to earn. Also I feel she's my hero because she made our family wonderful with "lead by example" no nonsense lifestyle.

I would like to thank Ted for sharing the passion for our town and the people who who made our great history. I would also like to thank Paula McHugh for the bridge that connected us.


A Knight called OSCAR

Since the initial awards banquet on May 16, 1929, in the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel's Blossom
Room, 2,947 statuettes have been presented.
Each January, additional new golden statuettes are cast, molded, polished and buffed by R.S. Owens & Company, the Chicago-based awards manufacturer retained by the Academy since 1982.

Oscar stands 13½ inches tall and weighs in at a robust 8½ pounds. The film reel features five spokes, signifying the five original branches of the Academy: actors, directors, producers, technicians and writers. Although the statuette remains true to its original design, the size of the base varied until 1945, when the current standard was adopted.

Officially named the Academy Award of Merit, the statuette is better known by its nickname, Oscar. While the origins of the moniker aren't clear, a popular story has it that upon seeing the trophy for the first time, Academy librarian (and eventual executive director) Margaret Herrick remarked that it resembled her Uncle Oscar. The Academy didn't adopt the nickname officially until 1939, but it was widely known enough by 1934 that Hollywood columnist Sidney Skolsky used it in a piece referring to Katharine Hepburn's first Best Actress win.

The statuettes presented at the initial ceremonies were gold-plated solid bronze. Within a few years the bronze was abandoned in favor of britannia metal, a pewter-like alloy which is then plated in copper, nickel silver, and finally, 24-karat gold. Due to a metal shortage during World War II, Oscars were made of painted plaster for three years. Following the war, the Academy invited recipients to redeem the plaster figures for gold-plated metal ones.

The Banks Building

The Delaware Street wharf as we know it was built in 1914. The Trustees paid half the cost about \$7,000. The only building left on the wharf at the foot of Delaware Street from the time of New Castle's industrial era is the Banks Building, a rare wooden survivor of a nineteenth century commercial structure in the vernacular Italianate style.

Named for Donald Banks, a prominent resident of the town and a Trustee of the Common, this building has seen many uses since it was built in 1871 as an office and our-of-house refuge for William Jefferson.

Over time it has been the custom house, marine exchange, and an office for a coal-



yard and the telegraph. Is is now the property of the City of New Castle.

The Banks Building is best remembered as a meeting place of the "senate," a group of older, retired men who gather for coffee and conversation.

Over its many years of existence, the "senate" has met at various locations, most famously in the back room at White's Ice Cream Parlor, a town fixture for many years at 204 Delaware Street.*

The City has been aware the depressed condition and has been working on the issue of restoration. An expert was hired in 2011 to evaluate of the current state of the building and an outline of a path forward for renovations and possible funding

sources. The foundation, floor joists, floors, walls, woodwork, stairs, siding, roofing all are in need of repair. As the City budget discussions near, the Banks Building topic will surely surface again. Hopefully this cherished landmark and an focal point of our waterfront heritage will receive the much needed restoration.


