Revolutionary War History Preserved

On Feb 22nd, The George Washington Society of Delaware honored the Cooch family for their long-term preservation of Delaware's Revolutionary War history.

More than fifty members of the Society were on hand, including Ed Becker, founding president of GWS. Founding members, Rev Dick Stazesky, and Jim Thomen, as current President, Kim Burdick and Sustaining Member Susan Brynteson presented Judge Cooch with a commemorative plaque. Revolutionary music was performed by well-known composer, Evelyn Swensson. Keynote speaker, archaeologist Wade Catts, gave an excellent talk about both the archaeological remains on the battlefield and the history of the Cooch family.

Richard R. Cooch and Anne Cooch Doran have said, "Our father, Edward W. Cooch, Jr. always said that he hoped that if the family house and battlefield, which he worked hard to preserve, ever left the Cooch family, that the property would be acquired by the State. In December 2018, Ned's dream came true.





All Council members were present plus City Administrator William Barthel, City Treasurer Janet Carlin, Finance Director Kathy Walls, and Building Official Jeff Bergstrom.

There were 3 issues for this Special Meeting: discussion and decision on running water and sewer lines on Delaware St. near the Wharf, a discussion of infrastructure, and further discussion of the FY21 budget.

SEWER AND WATER LINES NEAR THE WHARF

At our meeting Oct. 8, 2019 when we agreed to repave Delaware St. from the Wharf to 5th St. we deferred a decision on adding water and sewer lines near the Wharf to support the addition of a public restroom with shower facilities for visiting crews of tall ships at some point in the future. Today we had to make a decision about the water and sewer lines. Mr. Barthel said it would be best to make this decision now so that, if we decide to add the new lines, it could be done while our contractor, Cirillo Brothers, has their equipment in the area.

Russ Smith began the discussion by saying that we have attractions such as the Wharf and have a responsibility to provide services such as public restrooms to visitors. Linda Ratchford asked him for his opinion from a parks perspective (He was the 1st superintendent of the First State National Park.) He said visitors expect facilities and that the Delaware River itself is one of our main attractions so the area gets heavy use.

I asked about the issue of vandalism since we have had some reports of problems in the existing restrooms in Battery Park. I asked if Chief McCabe had been consulted about this. He was not. Michael Platt said he recalled that the Chief feared vandalism if the Little Library was placed near the Wharf so thought a restroom there would also be a target. Mr. Smith said a building such as a restroom is much less vulnerable than a small, free-standing item such as the Little Library. Valerie Leary said she spoke to a Trustee who told her there has been little vandalism in the existing restrooms in the Park. I asked if any restroom constructed could include automatic locks so the building could be closed at dusk. Yes it could; the current restroom in the Park has this feature.

Mr. Platt strongly opposes adding the water and sewer lines as he doesn't think the restroom will ever be built as the money will be needed for other projects. He sees no value to the City from the presence of tall ships here as any money spent by visitors goes to business owners. He thinks the funds for the addition of the water and sewer lines (\$45,000-\$50,000) would be better spent on paving more of Delaware St. He added that we can bring in portable toilets for special events which bring large crowds.

Ms Leary said that the idea of this is to prepare for the future. As someone involved in bringing the summer concerts to New Castle, she has heard complaints about the distance people must walk over uneven ground to the current restrooms. This is especially a problem for the older people attending concerts. Restrooms near the Wharf would be more accessible to concert-goers.

Mr. Smith said that tourism does bring benefit to the City and added that it is the only economic option in town. Tourism brings jobs and tourists need restrooms. Mr. Platt said since New Castle has no restaurant tax, drink tax, or wage tax tourism brings no benefit to the City. Mr. Smith replied that being seen as a vibrant place increases property values and sees this as making New Castle a positive experience for visitors. Mr. Platt still thinks it's a waste of money which could be better spent elsewhere. He said that downtown isn't the only part of New Castle. Mr. Smith asked if there aren't some residents of Van Dyke Village or Shawtown who work in the restaurants. Mr. Platt didn't know. Ms Ratchford said that making New Castle an attractive place draws businesses to the area such as Center Point.

Mr. Barthel said he consulted City Architect Leila Hamroun who was not able to be present at the meeting but sent recommendations. She advises the use of temporary restrooms (in a trailer rather than "port-a-potties") during the summer months which can be rented for \$1200-\$1450 per week for a 12-week minimum period.

Ms Leary said that the restrooms would benefit residents as well as visitors. Ms Ratchford asked if the sewer line could be added later. Mr. Bergstrom said it could but the cost would be higher, the newly paved street would be patched, and patches tend to cause maintenance problems. Mr. Platt repeated his objections and called this a "bridge to nowhere".

Ms Leary moved that we run the sewer line, Mr. Smith seconded the motion. Ms Leary pointed out that even temporary restrooms would require the water and sewer lines. Mr. Bergstrom said that if the lines were installed visiting ships could empty their holding tanks directly into the sewer line rather than having trucks come to drain the tanks as they do now.

Ms Ratchford said there is a benefit to restrooms in that area as many events are held there. Mr. Platt asked if we decide to do this, are there funds available. Mr. Barthel said that the current estimate for the Delaware St. Project, including the new sewer line, is \$1.9 million. We are still waiting for a response from Delmarva regarding the amount to be given to the City since we will be installing the pavement over areas they dig up to replace gas lines, a cost they would normally have to cover. We have an addition \$60,000 grant from our State legislators and a request for an additional \$30,000 is outstanding.

Ms Ratchford called for the vote and it passed 4-1 with Mr. Platt voting no. (I voted yes because I see this as an investment in the future and we can do it more economically now in conjunction with other work in the area.)

INFRASTRUCTURE REVIEW

Mr. Barthel began by saying that he, Mr. Bergstrom, and City Engineer Dave Athey have a list of projects in priority order. Currently the top 4 items are 2nd Street (\$300,000 with granite curbs or \$200,000 for paving only), 13th St. in Baldton (\$125,000), Brylgon St. (\$150,000), and Porter Alley (gravel road behind the Senior Center for \$150,000). Paving Porter Alley was requested by the fire department as they would prefer 3rd St. Extended to be one-way in with the exit via Porter Alley. They gave this "wish list" to Sen. Poore along with the request for Delaware St. Work on 2nd Street will probably be deferred until Delmarva installs the high-pressure gas lines there. Delmarva has a 5-year plan to complete this work in the downtown area. Shawtown, Washington Park, and Van Dyke Village have already had the new lines installed. Similar to the current coordination on Delaware St, it makes no sense for the City to repave 2nd St. before Delmarva does its work as they would dig up a newly paved street. MSC may well reline the water lines on 2nd as part of the same project.

Mr. Bergstrom added that the current low-pressure gas lines are very old and need to be replaced. Delmarva does this at no cost to homeowners and the City saves money by being reimbursed for part of the cost of repaving as with the Delaware St. Project. Granite curbs are required in the Historic District. I asked if my memory that, while more expensive to install, granite is more economical in the long run because it is so much more durable was correct. He said that is right. We re-use existing granite curbs whenever possible.

Ms Ratchford said that we hope we can move to underground utilities for other parts of town as Delmarva and the City do their work. City staff advises Council on priorities but only Council can approve the funding.

Mr Smith asked if we are currently taking care of priorities. Mr. Bergstrom said that we are. The backlog of work is diminishing even with the increased regulation of storm water run-off. He said nothing in the City currently puts people at risk such as problems with roads and bridges in some communities. He has worked here for 30 years and said we've done much better in the last 10 years than we did in his first 20 years.

BUDGET REVIEW

Mr. Smith asked where we are regarding resiliency. Mr. Barthel said there will be a meeting this coming Tuesday with Mr. Athey and a representative from DNREC about the current study of our shoreline and options for improving resiliency. They will prepare a summary for Council with action items. (Ms Ratchford and I will also be attending this meeting.)

Ms Ratchford said we are also awaiting a report regarding consolidation of city offices in a "City Campus" near the MSC office. Mr. Barthel said that

is not expected for another few months. Ms Ratchford reminding us that we have committed \$15,000 per year for the next 2 years for a WILMAPCO study of the roads in and out of City.

Mr. Smith asked about our emergency plan update. Mr. Barthel said ours is old, the last one was done in 2004 or 2005. Ms Leary brought up the issue of the increased train traffic in the area. Mr. Barthel said dealing with that is part of Goodwill Fire Department's emergency plan. Mr. Bergstrom said he will be participating in New Castle County's emergency planning. Mr. Barthel said he thinks we can get better value that way since Goodwill's plan cost \$25,000 to develop. I asked about emergency evacuation with increased flooding on area roads. Mr. Barthel said that is part of our plan. Mr. Smith said he will be going to a meeting where grants for emergency planning will be discussed. Ms Ratchford said that in the event of an emergency the fire department is in charge. Mr. Platt suggested that we see what the fire department has as there is no need to reinvent the wheel or pay for a duplicate study.

Ms Ratchford said that the new Comprehensive Plan will probably have some action items for the City. Mr. Barthel said that Planning Commission Chair Dave Baldini will come to the March meeting to update us on this. He thinks the new comp plan must be completed by the end of April.

Mr. Smith asked about costs from the Downtown Development District. Mr. Barthel said these are not expenditures, rather the loss of some revenue from fee and tax waivers.

Ms Ratchford asked about tree-removal and costs for planting city trees (any in the right of way) since we usually replace them. She added that we are fortunate to have a generous resident helping us plant trees. This year most of the tree budget went for removal.

Ms Ratchford asked about grants to non-profits. Mr. Barthel said the letters have gone out asking for a response by April 3, earlier than usual to aid in planning the budget.

Mr. Smith asked about funds for way-finding signs. I asked if signs for biking were included since proceeds from the River Towns Festival are dedicated to biking and tall ships. These signs are included in the planning.

Mr. Platt suggested that the City take the Mayor's suggestion and establish a 501(c)(3) to receive donations from local corporations. Mr. Smith said the problem with these is that City government can't tell them what to do or they lose their 501(c)(3) status. Mr. Barthel agreed but said the City can have some impact during initial set up. Ms Leary said we should use the existing 501(c)(3), the Community Partnership. Mr. Platt said no one knows what they do and he would like to see the Partnership take more initiative. Ms Leary said the City could make suggestions and I said that we should do that. Mr. Smith said we need to establish better communication between the City and the Community Partnership and Ms Ratchford agreed.

Mr. Smith said that while the City could do more for Goodwill they could also raise more, perhaps with a challenge grant whereby the City would match funds they raise up to a set amount. Ms Leary said Goodwill is at a disadvantage for fundraising because they don't have a hall to rent for weddings and other events. She said other fire departments have fund raisers such as a beef and beer and added that Goodwill is fortunate to have the Trust as a funding source in addition to the State and County. She added that some places add a fire/EMS assessment to water bills and New Castle doesn't do that. The fire department fears a loss of contributions if we did.

We closed with a brief discussion of other priorities. I mentioned funding for full-time staffing of the Visitors' Center. Mr. Platt said that brings no money to the City. Mr. Smith said tourism has a multiplier effect by bringing jobs and increase property values. I said I think we need to establish a capital reserve fund for resiliency and perhaps the city campus as well as the usual street and drainage work needed. Ms Leary suggested the creation of a part-time position for marketing and promoting the City.




