New Castle gathered at the New Castle Presbyterian Church Meeting House on July 4 to join "Bells Across the Nation" and celebrate the birth of American Independence. Following opening remarks from Mayor Quaranta, guest speaker Mr. Woolford shared the history of Black Loyalists and the Black Patriots of the American Revolution. Mr. Woolford is a noted preservationist and folk historian, perhaps best known locally for the preservation of the Buttonwood School in New Castle (purchased by the Trustees of New Castle Common in 1998 and later conveyed to the Buttonwood Civic Association), where his father was an instructor. The Color Guard of the Major Robert Kirkwood Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution opened and closed the program and the Cooch's Bridge DAR lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

Upcoming Delaware Street Lane Closures / Restrictions

On Tuesday, July 9, the City's contractor Cirillo Brothers will begin replacing the storm sewer, believed to be about a century old, in Delaware Street between 2nd Street and The Strand. This work will necessitate excavating and removing the existing pipe, plugging abandoned laterals, and placing a new pipe. The contractor will need to close

both lanes of Delaware Street to vehicular traffic between 2nd Street and The Strand, beginning at 7:00 a.m. each day, to perform the work. The contractor may also close the sidewalk on the north side of this section of road to not endanger the public but the southside sidewalk will remain open. All closures will be reopened by 5:00 p.m. each day, no closures will occur on weekends. The work is estimated to take between three and six weeks. Multiple unknowns do not allow for a more precise schedule.

During the lane closures, multiple warning signs will be placed and flaggers will be positioned at the intersections of Harmony Street and The Strand, in the middle of the Strand, and The Strand and Delaware Street. Local traffic will be allowed to pass at Harmony Street but through traffic will not. Residents of The Strand are asked to minimize their car usage as much as possible during this time period. In instances when usage is unavoidable, residents leaving their homes should proceed to Delaware Street as always where the flagger will direct them to turn around at the Wharf and then proceed up The Strand. The flagger at Harmony Street will block entering traffic until the exiting vehicle passes. The City understands that this may be inconvenient to some but with one-way traffic on area streets, this was determined to be the best approach.

Residents are asked to obey the flaggers' instructions.

Residents on Dalby Alley will not be able to access Dalby Alley, and of course there will be no parking on Delaware Street between the Strand and Second, during these times. Parked cars will be towed.

A second phase of work, not yet scheduled, will involve lining of the storm sewer between The Strand and the outfall at the River. This work will not involve excavations and will last just a few days but will necessitate temporary lane restrictions. Also, the larger project of restoring the pavement and curbs on Delaware Street from 3rd Street to the Wharf will be let for bidding in coming weeks with the intent of beginning work later in the fall. This work will last for many months and will necessitate both temporary lane restrictions as well as full closures at varying times. The City will provide more information for both as dates get closer.



2 lb. baby Yukon Gold potatoes •1 cup kosher salt, plus more • ¾ cup sour cream • ¼ cup mayonnaise • 1 tbsp. onion powder • 2 tsp. Dijon mustard 1 tsp. freshly ground black pepper • 1 garlic clove • 1 bunch chives ¼ small red onion • ½ cup sour cream and onion potato chips

Place 2 lb. baby Yukon Gold potatoes in a large pot, cover with 3 qt. water, then 1 cup kosher salt, and bring to a boil over medium-high heat. (Yes, this is a lot of salt, but it's the right amount for the job. Potatoes are big and dense—so it takes highly concentrated water to ensure they're seasoned through and through, Plus, think about how much of that gets left behind in the water you pour out!) Once water comes to a boil, reduce heat, adjusting as needed to maintain a simmer, and cook potatoes until fork-tender, 15–20 minutes.

Meanwhile, make your dressing. Combine ¾ cup sour cream, ¼ cup mayonnaise, 1 Tbsp. onion powder, 2 tsp. Dijon mustard, and 1 tsp. black pepper in a large bowl. Finely grate 1 garlic clove into dressing and stir to combine. Thinly slice 1 bunch chives. Transfer half of chives to dressing; set remaining aside for serving. Slice ¼ small red onion as thinly as possible through root end. (This might not be the way you usually cut an onion, but we're going for shallow arcs rather than chunky quarter-moons.) Transfer to a fine-mesh sieve and rinse for several seconds (this eliminates some of that astringent raw onion flavor). Pat dry with paper towels. Add half of onion to bowl with dressing; reserve remaining onion for serving.

When potatoes are tender, scoop out ½ cup potato cooking liquid—we're going to use this later to thicken the sauce, warm up the cold dairy, and flavor the potatoes. Drain potatoes in a colander and let cool 10 minutes or until cool enough to handle. Crush each potato slightly with your hands (it's easiest to do this if you transfer them to a baking sheet or big plate first) and add to bowl with dressing.

Toss potatoes with dressing and ¼ cup potato cooking liquid. You want to do this while the potatoes are still warm so that they'll better absorb all of the seasoning. Don't worry if the dressing looks a little loose and watery at the beginning—it will all get absorbed and be nice and creamy. Taste and add more salt or, if your dressing looks too thick, a splash of potato cooking liquid.

Top potatoes with reserved chives and onion. Crumble ½ cup sour cream and onion potato chips over—in big pieces if you really just want to be eating a bag of chips or in small pieces if you'd like more of a bread crumb effect.

Rosé All Day

Use your favorite

Use your favorite combination of herbs for this refreshing twist on sangria. We like to think of it as spa water but with a little buzz! It's perfect to serve at picnics or on any warm summer night.

divided -2 750-ml bottles rosé - ½ cup bianco vermouth - 1 bunch mixed herbs, such as basil,

1 bunch mixed herbs, such as basil, mint, tarragon, and/or parsley, divided - 2 12-oz. cans citrus soda, such as Limonata or Sprite

THE PREP Cut 3 cucumbers into spears; set aside. Coarsely chop remaining cucumber, then gently smash pieces with a rolling pin or the back of a heavy knife to soften flesh and release juices. Transfer all

cucumbers to a large pitcher. Add rosé and vermouth and stir to combine. Set aside a few of the prettiest herb sprigs and chill in a ziptop bag until ready to serve. Smack remaining herbs against a cutting board to release aromas and lightly bruise leaves and add to pitcher. Cover and chill at least 3 hours and up to overnight for flavors to meld.

Divide sangria among ice-filled glasses. Top off with soda. Garnish with reserved herbs.




