PLU codes

You know those little stickers on fruits and veggies? They're called **price look-up** (PLU) codes and they contain numbers that cashiers use to ring you up.

But you can also use them to make sure you're getting what you paid for. Here's what to look for:

• A five-digit number that starts with a 9 means the item is <u>organic</u>.

• A four-digit code beginning with a 3 or a 4 means the produce is probably conventionally grown. For example, regular small lemons sold in the U.S. are labeled 4033, large are 4053; small organic lemons are coded 94033, large are 94053.

• A five-digit code that starts with an 8 means the item is genetically modified (it has genes from other organisms). You won't see many of those because only genetically modified versions of <u>corn</u>, <u>soybeans</u>, canola, cotton, papaya, and squash are now widely sold. And because PLU codes aren't mandatory, companies can label those items as conventional. The problem is that although an estimated 60 to 70 percent of food items sold, including packaged goods, have genetically modified ingredients, little is known about the long-term effects of consuming them, and concerns have been raised about an increase in allergies and other health issues.

I write this morning to commend New Castle on it's effort at branding. We have just completed the exercise here but I am sorry to report it did not go well.

You all, however, seem to be on a much more energetic and appropriate path as you include economic developers, small businesses, residents, government and tourism specialists, just to mention a few.

I can but caution the "branders":

There is much more to it than just creating a logo and a catch phrase. And frankly, I am amazed you are seeking even more people to come and crowd your streets and pubs and sidewalks. Every time we have been to Jessop's the joint has been packed! And, it should go without saying, there really isn't much in the way of overnight accommodations.

Here in New Bern, within four square blocks in the historic district, we have over a dozen restaurants and bars and 17 hotels and bed and breakfasts, all within walking distance (even for old people) of the confluence of two rivers. That adds up to about 400 beds and barely enough places to park the appropriate number of vehicles. Parking, for us, is a HUGE issue. Our government is toying with the idea of a parking garage and parking meters to fund its construction...an idea which gets NO resident support. Merchants say it is needed, shoppers disagree. They are quite content driving around the block one or two times in order to find a parking place.

As an occasional visitor I would urge caution. You have a beautiful, alive and vibrant historic town. One would be hard-pressed to make it better than what it has become since the first brick was cast so many years ago.






