

"There is nothing more tried and true than a restaurant that has been in business for a couple of hundred years, like - City Tavern in Philadelphia, established 1773. When our second

President, John Adams, was taken there for the first time, he was said to remark that it was "the most genteel tavern in America." But it was too late for Adams to make Presidential dining history -Washington had eaten there daily for an extended period in the early 1770s along with other members of the Continental Congress. As the restaurant's history notes, "No doubt, matters of momentous importance were discussed and decided over a glass of Madeira and steaming roast of venison."

Today the City Tavern is unusual in that it serves up authentic (or as authentic as we can make it today) Colonial fare. Part theme park and part eatery, its mission is to interpret and deliver the culinary traditions of the late 18th century, and its menu includes braised rabbit, lobster tavern pie and venison medallions - along with fried tofu, a dish it claims Benjamin Franklin described how to make in a letter dated 1770." #### **MORE GEORGE**

Washington owned many slaves at Mount Vernon. However, by the end of his life, he had come to view the necessity of freeing his slaves. In fact, he freed all of them in his will. He even provided for pensions for some of his slaves. He was the only Founding Fathers to free his slaves.

He was the only president who did not live in Washington D.C.

The nation's capital, along with 1 state, 31 counties and 17 cities (Maybe 18 counting the town of "George," in central Washington State) are named in his honor.

As a farmer, Washington grew marijuana on his farm and promoted it's growth. (In the 1790s, the crop was grown mainly for its industrial value as hemp and for soil stabilization. It was many years later that the recreational and illegal use of marijuana became popular.) And he is credited with introducing the mule to America.

Add being the first Mason to serve as president.

He was the only president to win a unanimous vote of the Electoral College. His ▶ 2nd inaugural address was the shortest ever delivered - 135 words.

Only President inaugurated in 2 cities - New York and Philadelphia Only President that did not live in the White House. He was involved in the planning of the Capitol.

Washington did his own bookkeeping and recorded every penny of expense or profit. His ledgers still exist today.

Five states were added to the Union during Washington's presidency - North Carolina (1789), Rhode Island (1790), Vermont (1791), Kentucky (1792), and Tennessee (1796).



## 'the patient gardener'

**Not your everyday 'tree house"** but a structure consisting of ten japanese cherry trees which is the main building material for the construction of a two-story retreat. bending, twisting, pruning and grafting will be used to control and develop the growth of the building over time.

The trees, chosen because of the time of year and good suitability for the project, were planted around in an 8 meter diameter ring.

To assist in the bending of the trees, a temporary tower



stands in the center with ropes attached to the plants, pulling them gently to create a bend in the trunk as it grows. the stairs, handrails and safety features will be grafted from fruit trees, generating food simultaneously.

A simple maintenance plan and instructs will be passed on to future gardeners. the final result can be enjoyed on the campus within 80 years.



This recipe makes 6 servings. Hands-on time: 9 minutes, hands-off time: time to preheat the oven, plus 30 to 40 minutes.



Line a

Add the

Ingredients

11/2 lbs baby carrots

2 lbs red or white potatoes; cut into 1-inch

1 tbsp plus 2 tsp extra virgin olive oil, divided

Sea salt and pepper

One 13/4-lb trimmed top round roast 51/2-ounce can tomato juice (I used Campbell's)

2 tsp dried thyme

2 medium onions, trimmed, peeled, and cut into quarters

Directions

Preheat the oven to 450°F.

large roasting pan with nonstick aluminum foil. carrots and potatoes.

Drizzle 1 tbsp plus 1 tsp of the olive oil over the vegetables and season

them with salt and pepper.

Toss just to combine, then distribute them in an even layer in the bottom of the pan, leaving room for the roast in the center. Rub the roast all over with the remaining 1 tsp olive oil, then season it with 1/4 tsp salt and 1/4 tsp pepper. Set it in the center of the veggies and pour the juice evenly over all. Sprinkle the thyme over the top. Roast the meat, carrots, and potatoes for 18 minutes. Then, stir the potatoes and carrots (if using nonstick foil, be careful not to tear it). Separate the onion quarters into pieces. Scatter them over the potatoes and carrots. Continue roasting until a meat thermometer inserted in the center of the roast reads 125°F; for medium rare, about 15 to 20 minutes more.

Carefully transfer the roast to a platter.

Loosely tent the roast with foil for 10 minutes while the juices redistribute internally.

If the veggies are not tender, rotate them one more time and continue roasting, up to 10 minutes more.

Slice the meat into thin slices against the grain and serve immediately with the veggies.

You don't have to use the nonstick foil here if you have a really good nonstick roasting pan, but it makes cleanup almost nonexistent, so I swear by it.



### **Comic Catharsis: A Gift of Cartoons**

by William Steig

### Although best known today as the creator of Shrek,

William Steig (1907-2003) first achieved fame for his cartoons and covers for The New Yorker and his published books of drawings such as The Lonely Ones (1942), Small Fry (1944), and *Dreams of Glory and Other Drawings* (1953). His situational gags are humorous and offer keen observations on various aspects of human relationships. Steig's drawing style in early works show emphatic, incisive lines and tonal washes. Late in Steig's career he began creating children's books that explore, in a lighter vein, many of the same themes as his cartoons for adults. Steig wrote and illustrated over 30 acclaimed works for children, including the Caldecott-winning Sylvester and the Magic Pebble (1969) and Shrek! (1990). The exhibition

will feature over 100 works donated to the Brandywine River Museum in 2010 by Jeanne Steig from the artist's estate, as well as selected works for children on loan from the Eric Carle Museum of Picture Book Art and private collections.
