He was born just a few blocks from where I grew up: Jimmy Cagney, the American film legend playing George M. Cohan, the man who owned Broadway. Cohan wrote the American anthems "Yankee Doodle Boy," "Over There" and "You're a Grand Old Flag." And as we celebrate the 235th anniversary of our Declaration of Independence, I'm like a lot of you: I'm proud to be a Yankee Doodle Dandy through and through.



You see, our flag represents the deepest pride of our nation, not our deepest prejudice. Our flag displays our history, not our hysteria. It flies to announce our very best aspirations born of the toil of our very worst days. It flies amidst man-made canyons on this Avenue of Americas in New York City and in canyons carved by time from colored stone in Arizona. And as it whips in the wind, it whispers to us that the American Revolution was only a beginning and not an end. And whether it flies in a lonely military outpost in Afghanistan or from the highest point of the Capitol, it announces the blessings of freedom. Not because we blindly claim freedom, but because we fearlessly practice it.

So this July 4th, let's celebrate our independence in uniquely American ways: At parades where our brave volunteer firefighters hurl fistfuls of candy to our delighted children; as Mummers and returning veterans and Shriners and church ladies and all kinds of neighbors.

First and tenth generation Americans alike march as one people with one shared understanding: We the people who understand that the blessings we enjoy are earned through the burdens we necessarily endure. The same people who live the words of Thomas Paine, "Those who expect to reap the blessings of freedom must undergo the fatigue of supporting it."

There are some who say "it's easy to wave a flag." Well, it's even easier to make fun of those who do. There are some who will tell you that our flag only serves to divide. The truth is it serves to remind us as the most diverse and inclusive civilization in the history of mankind of what really unites us: To believe, to think, to speak, to act — freely, fearlessly.

If you're at the fireworks this weekend and you see a man guietly



move away from the crowd to escape the thunder, there's a good chance he's seen the real bombs bursting in air. Go stand by him because he likely stood watching over us as we safely slept in the hometowns he has kept free. We are lucky. It is a grand old flag on a happy day in America.







Have you ever wondered what happened to those men who signed the Declaration of Independence?

Five signers were captured by the British as traitors, and tortured before they died. Twelve had their homes ransacked and burned. Two lost their sons in the Revolutionary Army, another had two sons captured. Nine of the 56 fought and

died from wounds or the hardships of the Revolutionary War.

What kind of men were they? Twenty-four were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners, men of means, well educated. But they signed the Declaration of Independence knowing full well that the penalty would be death if they were captured.

They signed and they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred bonor

Carter Braxton of Virginia, a wealthy planter and trader, saw his ships swept from the seas by the British navy. He sold his home and properties to pay his debts, and died in rags.

Thomas McKean was so hounded by the British that he was forced to move his family almost constantly. He served in the Congress without pay, and his family was kept in hiding. His possessions were taken from him, and poverty was his reward.

Vandals or soldiers or both, looted the properties of Ellery, Clymer, Hall, Walton, Gwinnett, Heyward, Ruttledge, and Middleton.

At the Battle of Yorktown, Thomas Nelson Jr., noted that the British General Cornwallis, had taken over the Nelson home for his headquarters. The owner quietly urged General George Washington to open fire, which was done. The home

was destroyed, and Nelson died bankrupt.

Francis Lewis had his home and properties destroyed. The enemy jailed his wife, and she died within a few months.

John Hart was driven from his wife's bedside as she was dying. Their 13 children fled for their lives. His fields and his grist mill were laid waste. For more than a year he lived in forests and caves, returning home after the war to find his wife dead, his children vanished. A few weeks

later he died from exhaustion and a broken heart.

Norris and Livingston suffered similar fates.

Such were the stories and sacrifices of the American Revolution. These were not wild-eyed, rabble-rousing ruffians. There were soft-spoken men of means and education. They had security, but they valued liberty more. Standing tall, straight, and unwavering, they pledged: "For the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of the Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other, our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor."





As we celebrate **Independence Day**, what better way to celebrate than to serve up one of Americas favorite foods, the **HOT DOG! So get ready to fire up the grill and cook!**

Quick Cooking Tips Hot dogs can be grilled, steamed, boiled, micro-waved, or baked. If you're grilling your dogs, make sure to control the heat to a medium or medium low heat, charcoal is best. Use tongs to handle the franks as they cook instead of a fork. This way you won't pierce holes in the franks allowing for the delicious juices to remain inside-this is sure to satisfy your guests!

CHICAGO DOGS Yellow mustard, dark green relish, chopped raw onions, tomato slices, celery salt and a poppy seed bun

CAROLINA DOGS Steamed with sauerkraut or coleslaw

KANSAS CITY DOGS Sauerkraut and melted Swiss cheese on a sesame seed bun.

NEW YORK CITY DOGS Boiled with grilled onions and deli mustard

CONEY ISLAND DOGS Boiled and topped with a spicy meat chili. **TEX-MEX DOGS** Topped with salsa, Monterey Jack cheese, and chopped jalapenos.

BOSTON DOGS Boiled, then grilled topped with mustard and relish in a potato bun or lobster roll.

AND OF COURSE...Hebrew National franks grilled on a soft whole wheat bun with NY Joe's onions and Gulden's mustard!

Buffalo Blue Sliders

Ingredients

1 1/2 lbs ground turkey or <u>chicken</u> Kosher salt and freshly cracked black pepper 1 tbsp <u>canola oil</u>

1/4 cup wing

sauce

1 tbsp honey Mini burger buns, sliced and toasted

Celery leaves, torn 1/2 cup blue cheese crumbles Blue Cheese <u>Dressing</u>


BLUE CHEESE DRESSING:

2 oz crumbled <u>blue cheese</u> (about 1/3 cup)

- 2 tbsps mayonnaise
- 2 tbsps buttermilk
- 2 tbsps sour cream
- 1 tsp cider vinegar
- 1/4 tsp sugar
- 1/8 tsp garlic powder
- 1/8 tsp onion powder

Directions

Form the ground <u>turkey</u> or chicken into 2-oz patties. Sprinkle both sides of each <u>patty</u> liberally with salt and pepper.



Meanwhile, in a small <u>saucepan</u> over medium heat, bring the wing sauce and <u>honey</u> to a <u>simmer</u>. Remove from the heat and stir. Brush the wing <u>glaze</u> over both sides of the cooked patties.

Build the burgers by placing each cooked patty on the bun bottoms. Top with celery leaves and crumbled blue cheese. Smear the top buns with the Blue Cheese Dressing and place on top of the other ingredients. Serve immediately.

Using the tongs of a fork, mash together the blue cheese and mayonnaise in a small bowl. Stir in the buttermilk, sour cream, vinegar, sugar, garlic powder and onion powder. Season with salt and pepper. Cover and keep in the refrigerator until ready to use.
